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Pliable Polymer Clay Pin Heads

Add a bit of flair to your pins!



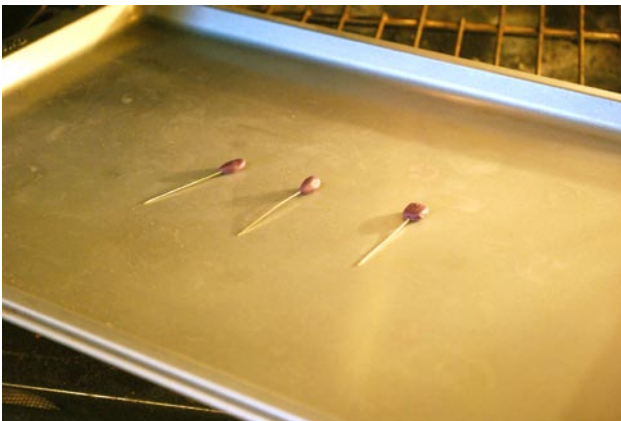
Here's what you'll need:

Polymer Clay
Straight Pins (longer is better, like quilter's pins)
Acrylic Paint
Polymer Clay Glaze



Here's what you'll do:

Pinch off a small amount of clay and press around the head of a pin. Make the shapes as simple or complex as you like.



Bake your pins according to the clay package's instructions, but you'll want to reduce the baking time. For my Sculpey clay, I baked the pins for 8 minutes at 250 degrees.



After the clay has cooled, paint the pin heads. Depending on the color of your clay and paint, this will take several coats. Some of these took 4-5 coats.

Add some decoration, like little faces.



Finish with a coat of glaze to seal the pin heads and make them all shiny. Once they are dry, enjoy pinning in style!
